I. Welcome/Introductions

Monica started meeting with introductions of everyone.

Overview of Tri-County MAPP Process

Monica gave an overview of the process. State administrative code requires local health departments to conduct a community health needs assessment and improvement plan every five years. And, the Affordable Care Act requires hospitals to do a community health needs assessment and improvement plan every three years.

The Tri-County Community Health Collaborative (local and regional hospitals, local health departments, United Way, Heartland Community Health Clinic, and Bradley University) worked together to conduct a community health needs assessment and improvement plan for the tri-county region (Peoria, Tazewell, and Woodford Counties).

The Tri-County MAPP (Mobilized Action through Planning and Partnerships) is a broader group of community stakeholders that includes the members of the Collaborative as well as community agencies, governments, school districts, non-profits, and faith-based organizations across the tri-county region. The MAPP group completed four assessments: Community Health Status (the assessment completed by the Tri-County Community Health Collaborative), Community Themes and Strengths, Forces of Change, and Local Public Health Systems Assessment.

From the four assessments, the following health issues were prioritized:

- Healthy eating/active living (HEAL)
- Behavioral health (Mental health, Substance Abuse, Suicide, and Access)
- Cancer (lung and breast); primarily Tazewell and Woodford Counties)
- Reproductive Health (teen births, preterm births, low birth weight, and STIs); primarily Peoria County

II. Data Review of Objective Information

Data from 2010-2014 show Peoria County is consistently higher with respect to teen birth than state and national values. More specifically, African American/Black females and those residing in zip codes 61603, 61604, and 61605 had the highest teen birth rates. The same applies to preterm and low birth weight babies. The March of Dimes 2015 Premature Birth Report Card gave the City of Peoria an "F" due to high values within these same three zip codes. In Peoria County, rates of Chlamydia are nearly double the state values, and Gonorrhea is approximately six times the state values. Tazewell County's rates are comparable with state values, while Woodford County's are below state values.

When asked what they perceived as the biggest health issues in the community, the general population ranked mental health at the top followed by obesity, cancer, aging, diabetes, early sexual activity then STIs.

When asked what they consider unhealthy behaviors in the community, drug abuse, anger/violence, and poor eating habits were in the top three.

When asked to select the three most important issues impacting well-being in the community, job opportunities ranked number one, followed by safe neighborhoods, and healthy food choices.

III. Gap Analysis

A gap analysis was done by dividing participants into three groups: Preterm and Low Birth Weight, STIs, and Teen Births. Each group was given five questions pertaining to the topic to discuss. After approximately 20 minutes participants rotated to the next topic area. Monica advised that the gap analysis was a way to provide feedback about the barriers, opportunities and need for community partners.

Next steps will to determine the goals and objectives for the community improvement plan. Objectives will be written in the SMART (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, and Time Based) format.

- **Specific.** What you want to accomplish. Identifies who (target population), what (action/activity/behavior), and by how much.
- **Measurable.** The ability to collect, detect and/or obtain information/data to demonstrate the desired change.
- **Achievable.** Can be realistically accomplished given current resources and constraints.
- **Relevant.** Likely to have an effect on the desired goal. Ties into mission/vision.
- **Time bound.** Provides a timeframe by which change will be achieved.

Healthy People 2020 (HP2020) is a National health promotion and disease prevention initiative that sets science-based, ten-year goals and objectives for improving the health of all Americans. Reproductive and Sexual Health, and Maternal, Infant and Child Health are among the Leading Health Indicators (LHIs)

identified as high-priorities. To help communities address these health issues, HP2020 has compiled evidence-based interventions and research across each topic area. Our tri-county community health improvement plan will select from these (and others) evidenced-based strategies.
